## **Hear Us**

As spring rolled around, the excitement for Hear Us was growing. Hear Us is an annual youth advocacy training and trip hosted by ElevatEd Youth Coalition, a group of area teens who are passionate about preventing substance misuse among their peers. Participants were trained in a variety of topics including advocacy 101, current

alcohol, cannabis, and nicotine data, and more. It culminated in an overnight trip to Jefferson City to meet with their local legislators to discuss policies important to the teen. It was a great activity for kids passionate about politics, who wanted to learn more about the prevention world, or who wanted to take

a trip to explore a new topic. Participants reported feeling \more confident communicating with legislators and peers about issues that are important to them and that they can see that advocacy can make an impact on their community. In addition, the teens made connections with their fellow participants, creating a network of youth leaders from schools all around the region. Teens left feeling more competent, confident, and knowing that their voice is important. Young people will change the political landscape in the years to come and Hear Us can be a part of their story. ElevatEd invites any high-school-aged teens of all backgrounds, passions, and experience levels to join Hear Us or the coalition.

## In the Weeds

Over one year ago, Missouri voters legalized adult use cannabis. As I have written about here, PreventEd's phone immediately began ringing with calls from concerned parents, business owners, elected officials, and school administrators. Questions about how to navigate the legality of cannabis, while at the same time protecting youth, are nothing new for us at PreventEd. What is new, however, are the seemingly

insurmountable hurdles that the legalization, and more detrimentally, the commercialization has created.

So what are we doing about it?

Because we are, first and foremost, a prevention agency, we are continuing to go on the offensive. Our school-based prevention programs are nearly back to pre-pandemic levels. Requests for cannabis and vaping education (beginning in 5th grade) far outweigh other primary prevention requests from area schools. We are harnessing the power of peers through our high school cannabis peer education program, aptly named "It's Complicated." Results from a randomized control trial demonstrate statistically significant increases in knowledge and perception of harm among the peer teachers and the students receiving the peer-taught lessons. With local funding, PreventEd staff are currently implementing It's Complicated throughout the eastern region. Because the demand is great, but funding is scarce, we are working hard to find funding to implement the peer program statewide.

Further downstream, PreventEd's GuidEd program has exploded in the wake of the cannabis legalization. During one evening in January, we welcomed 23 high schoolers at an educational workshop. These are 23 young people who have started experimenting with substances (overwhelmingly cannabis) and have started experiencing difficulties at home and school as a result.

In the last several months, a handful of local middle and high schools have made the news for unfortunate reasons. Cannabis edibles and vape cartridges brought onto school property have led to

# **Vending Machines - An Answer to Community Narcan Access**

The community has spoken and PreventEd listened! The lifesaving overdose drug – Narcan – should be conveniently available around-the-clock in order to save lives. Community coalitions and partners researched the idea of vending machines to meet this need.

the purchase of three
machines for placement
in Franklin County. In
October, these machines
were placed in Union
at the Franklin County
Resource Center; at the
St. Clair branch of the
Scenic Regional Library;
and at Mercy Hospital in
Washington. Each machine
holds 150 boxes (300 doses)
of Narcan. Since the machines

have been installed, over 1,200 boxes have been distributed within the community through vending machines. There is one documented case of a life being saved by the medication received from the dispenser.

A fourth machine was purchased in November and placed outside of PreventEd's main office in St. Louis County. In addition to Narcan, this particular machine also offers intra-muscular naloxone with syringes and fentanyl and xylazine test strips – all completely free of charge.

Helen was a pioneer in addiction in St. Louis and worked for NCADA (now PreventEd) from 1965 until her death in 1976. Since 1977, the award has been presented to a local counseling professional that has dedicated themselves to the field.
